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## **WELCOME TO DAY ON THE HILL!**

We are thrilled to have all of you here participating in our advocacy day. Today, President's Day, is when we start to see the light at the end of the tunnel. How? Because the Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee has begun setting the budget, starting with public schools! We'll have more to report by the next issue on what the proposed final budget will look like. In the meantime, we're thrilled to have you here talking to your legislators about the issues and successes you face in each of your school districts and charter schools.

## **UPDATE ON PSFF**

Stakeholders have been convening in the early mornings to start making technical changes to the bill based on the listening session from the first week of February. So far, we have made progress in figuring out the payments schedule to avoid any problems of cash flow for school districts and charter schools. Additionally, we are working through the problems with the wealth adjustment, technical terms, and definitions. On that note, [I'd like to share the Idaho Center for Fiscal Policy's analysis on the wealth adjustment.](#) One assurance I can give is that all stakeholders are at the table and will work diligently to ensure that this is done properly.

## **BILLS TO PUT ON YOUR RADAR**

### **Firearms in Schools (not yet printed)**

We have heard rumblings of an egregious piece of legislation to essentially allow for anyone over the age of 18 to carry a firearm in school grounds. It was on the agenda for print in House State Affairs on Wednesday, but was pulled at the last minute. ISBA's GAC voted unanimously to oppose this bill, as it usurps all local control of school districts' and charter schools' decisions on whether to allow firearms in their school buildings.

### **Teacher Pay (HB153)**

Governor's Little's office introduced a piece of legislation that would bring the minimum teacher salary up to \$40,000 over the next two years. If it passes, it will have to run as trailer appropriation to the public schools budget. In addition, it will be interesting to see how it plays out once the funding formula passes. Nonetheless, one of the Governor's goals has been to help increase teacher salaries.

### **Executive Session on Simple Majority (HB150)**

This is our legislation which would allow school district and charter school boards to enter into executive session with a simple majority vote if they have two or more vacancies on the board. This will be a hard bill to pass, but we're grateful to Rep. Bill Goesling for his work on having it introduced in committee. If you've ever experienced multiple resignations or recall elections for trustees, we'd ask that you discuss what that was like with your legislators.

## **UPDATE ON SOME BILLS FROM LAST WEEK**

### **Immunization Exemption Disclosure (HB133)**

This legislation did print in House Health and Welfare committee this past Monday. As Karen noted last week, it will require all of you to notify parents and guardians of the immunization exemption in the same manner you notify them of the requirement to immunize. While we understand the parental choice of immunization exemptions, we are also cognizant of the need to provide a safe and healthy environment for all students. Parents who object to immunizations are already aware of the exemptions. If they are not aware, information is readily available to them. In addition to the administrative burden this would put on school districts and charter schools, we fear it could cause an increase in parents choosing not to immunize simply out of convenience. **This bill will be heard in House Health & Welfare on Wednesday, February 20<sup>th</sup>.**

### **Sex Education (HB120)**

We have been working with Rep. Ehardt to combat the plethora of misinformation, as well as help educate legislators on the existing rights of parents to inspect all curricular materials, including that of sex education lessons. When you are talking with legislators at Day on the Hill, you may visit about your district or charter school's experience with reviewing/adopting curricular materials.

### **Redistricting (HJR2)**

After a foreseeable outcry from the minority party, HJR2 was pulled back to committee.

### **Charter School Administrator (SB1058)**

This had a hearing this past week and passed the committee on a party-line vote. As a reminder, this would create a new certification process for charter school administrators. The IASA and the IEA stood up to oppose the legislation, and the State Board of Education voted to oppose it as well. It almost exactly mirrors the bill from the 2018 legislative session that was vetoed by Governor Otter.

### **Threats Upon School Grounds (HB115)**

This legislation allows for a police officer to arrest an individual who has made a threat upon school grounds. While you're here at Day on the Hill, this bill will be having a hearing in the House Judiciary, Rules & Administration committee at 1:30 p.m. (right after the legislative luncheon). If you'd like to attend the hearing and testify, we welcome you to do so. Please reach out to me if you have any questions!

## **ISBA LEGISLATION BASED ON RESOLUTIONS**

Below is our progress on each of the ISBA Resolutions.

### **Revision of Idaho Code on Excision (2018) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We have drafted legislation, and the sponsoring district is working with their local legislator in hopes of finding a sponsor.

### **Education Allocation for Out of State Teachers (2018) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We are hoping to include language amendments in the Funding Formula bill when we begin negotiations.

### **Card Check for Negotiations (2018) – HB647**

**Status:** This legislation passed last year and is now law.

### **CTE Teachers Experience Factor (2018) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We are hoping to include language amendments in the Funding Formula bill if and when that surfaces.

### **Contracts for Teachers Holding an Interim Certification under an Alternate Route (2018) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** Although it passed the Senate unanimously, this legislation failed to pass the House Education committee last year. *After speaking with the school district that brought this legislation, we don't think we are going to be able to come to consensus on this bill.*

### **Move School Board Trustee Elections to November of Odd Years – (2018), SB1280**

**Status:** This legislation passed and is now law.

### **Transportation Reimbursement (2018) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** This legislation needs a sponsor. However, there would be winners and losers under this legislation. We are asking to see if there would be any chance to refund the \$7.5 million that was removed during the

recession. This is the only recession era cut that has not been restored. We are not hopeful that the funding will be available.

### **K-12 Funding Principles (2018)**

**Status:** This resolution addresses the work of the Funding Formula Committee. Now that the Committee has finished their work, we will work closely with the House and Senate Education Chairs.

### **Discussion of the Sale of Public Property in Executive Session (2018) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We were unable to come to terms with the Press Club on this language last year. We will try again this year but are not hopeful.

### **Permissible Education Activities in School Bond and Levy Elections (2018) – HB620**

**Status:** This legislation passed and is now law.

### **Salary Based Apportionment for Classified Salaries (2019) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We have drafted legislation. The sponsoring districts are working to find a legislative sponsor. Because this legislation carries a very large fiscal note and because some legislators are working on the funding formula legislation, we are not sure if the Legislature will be willing to address this issue this year.

### **Reduce Super Majority on Facility Bonds (2019) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We have drafted legislation. As usual, we don't expect to see any movement on this legislation this year. We are hoping to convince some legislators to put a group of people together to discuss this issue. We are hopeful that we make some headway with a task force discussion.

### **Executive Session on Simple Majority (2019) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We have drafted legislation and secured a sponsor for this legislation. *The sponsor has drafted the legislation and we hope to have it printed this week.*

### **Funding for Full Day Kindergarten (2019) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** We have drafted legislation. Rep. Paul Amador has agreed to sponsor the bill. We met with Chair Clow this week. We believe we will get a print hearing on this bill and hope that the Committee will agree to move it forward for a full hearing. It will NOT make it out of committee but we believe it is a good sign that the Chair is willing to have a hearing on the bill.

### **Opposition to Public Funds Diverted to Private Schools (2019)**

**Status:** This resolution does not require any legislation. We are hearing that a Representative will be bringing full blown tax credit legislation. We are hopeful that we can keep it from moving forward again this year. We will be reaching out to you to contact your legislators on this issue when it comes forward.

### **Amending School Age Statute for Flexibility (2019) – Legislation Needed**

**Status:** *After speaking with the Committee Chair this week, we were unsuccessful in convincing him to hear this bill. We will attempt to work on it next year.*

## Recourse for Charter School Renewals (2019)

**Status:** After speaking with a representative from the State Board of Education, we believe that we can accomplish the tenets of this resolution through Administrative Rule. The SBOE will work on a rule after the legislation session and, if passed, it will go into effect in 2020.

## Strategic Plans and Reporting Requirements (2019) – Legislation Needed

**Status:** This bill has been printed and will likely be heard in Senate Education this week.

## Threats on School Grounds (2019) – Legislation Needed

**Status:** This bill has been printed, and is scheduled for a hearing on February 19<sup>th</sup> at 1:30 p.m.
